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Greater Houston Stamp Show is Under Preparation

We are on the eve of our annual stamp show, Greater Houston Stamp Show (GHSS), so now is the time to start planning your participation in the show. We assume that most of our club members will attend the show over the weekend of September 18-20, 2015 at the Humble Civic Center, but there are other opportunities than just attending.

Other details are shown in the flier on page 3. It starts with volunteering. Club members who volunteer are what makes GHSS the best philatelic event between St. Louis, Phoenix and Orlando. We need volunteers for a number of activities, especially those listed below.

- Set-up day, September 17, from 1-6 pm
- The Reception Table, all three days
- The Concessions Booth, all three days
- The Beginner's Booth, all three days
- Tear-Down on Sunday from 4-6 pm

Typically, volunteering during the show consists of 2 or 3 hour shifts. To volunteer, contact Show Chair Denise Stotts during an HPS meeting or get in touch with her by e-mail at stottsjd@swbell.net.

Another way several HPS members participate and enhance their collecting experience is by exhibiting. Exhibiting is a way to share their collection with the general public and at the same time compete for special awards and win a medal. This year's exhibit has already been filled, so entries are closed.

The main feature will be the annual single-frame color competition. At press time we have 15 single-frame Green stamp exhibits. This will be the country's largest and most impressive single frame competition other than the two APS sponsored national shows, Stampshow and Ameristamp Expo.

Attending the Awards Dinner is yet another way to enhance your weekend at the show. The dinner is held at the show hall shortly after the show ends on Saturday and is a come-as-you-are event. It is casual

So, if you attend the show annually to shop and make contact with fellow collectors, consider expanding your participation.





Seebeck and the Hamilton Bank Note Engraving & Printing Co.

Nicholas Frederick Seebeck was notorious to stamp collectors of the 1890's. The story has been told countless time in the last 100 years, but is certainly worth telling again.


Seebeck was born in Germany on February 19, 1857, but was brought to the United States at age 9.

Stamp Dealer and Publisher

In his teens, he engaged himself in philately as a stamp dealer, becoming familiar with the hobby, collectors and what drove them.

He also became a job shop printer in New York City and his business also handled stationery, paper goods, etc.

He soon combined his two specialties and started actually producing stamps in 1879. He printed stamps for the Dominican Republic and for the state of Bolivar in Colombia.

In the mid 1880s he came up with a scheme to make money based on his experiences both in the stamp dealing and stamp printing businesses.

His plan was ingenious. His plan required some business changes first. In 1884, he sold his lucrative stamp business to another dealer, a man named Gustave B. Calman. He took the proceeds and invested them in a distraught New York banknote firm, the Hamilton Bank Note Engraving & Printing Co.

Hamilton was a major printer of millions of railroad tickets and other transportation tickets, but they were in trouble due to the national financial Panic of 1884.

Seebeck invested his stamp business proceeds into Hamilton. The company was stagnant, but on May 1, 1885, an arrangement was made with Seebeck. He gave up his stationery business, transferring those assets to Hamilton. He also invested his stamp business proceeds to inject capital into the banknote business.

Conversely, Hamilton appointed Seebeck the company's Secretary and General Manager and issued him 5000 shares in the company.

In 1886, Seebeck made a stamp buying trip to the West Indies and Latin America. This gave him a chance to acquaint himself with their mannerisms and customs.

In 1888, he engaged Calman to dispose of the stamps. At this time, Calman, a wholesale stamp dealer, had become the largest dealer in stamp remainders in the U.S. Seebeck also engaged him to play a role in his "plan".

The Plan

By 1889, Seebeck was ready to launch his plan. He obtained letters of introduction from his brother-in-law, Ernest Schernikow who was the Salvadorian Consul in New York City.

His plan was to offer to print stamps at Hamilton for countries free of charge. In exchange, The countries would annually return the unsold remainders back to him. He intended to sell these remainders on the stamp collector market. He also would retain the printing plates and the rights to reproduce

stamps as needed. He also intended to secure a 10-year contract, creating the need for each country to generate the need for additional new stamps each year since the remainders had been returned to Seebeck.

At this time, Hamilton was prospering, largely due to Seebeck's activities on their behalf, so they went along with almost anything he proposed.

He set sail in January, 1889. He was unsuccessful obtaining contracts with Costa Rica or Guatemala, but in March he obtained a ten year deal with El Salvador and the following month made a deal with Honduras and Nicaragua. Unsolicited, Ecuador became a customer in 1891.

Collector Outcry

Almost immediately, the collecting community complained. For these stamps, there apparently would be an unending supply of reprints.

Collectors of the period also considered it abusive for countries to issue long sets with high face values. For them, too many unnecessary stamps were being released. Collectors also perceived that, if

they purchased these stamps, they could never increase in value due to the fact that there could always be more printed.

Collectors tended to limit themselves to collect only the used versions, assuming these were genuine and had more potential value, which led to a flood of cancelled-to-order stamps.

Many collectors, because of the reasons listed above, regarded the stamps as only labels and refused to collect them.

Seebeck was surprised by the outcry and wrote numerous letters to the philatelic press in defense of his acts. He contended that if he hadn't thought of the plan and executed it, sooner or later someone else would have. He explained what a great business deal it was for both Hamilton and the countries involved.

The U.S. 1894 Stamp Contract

In the middle of all this, Hamilton, with the comfort of knowing they were printing the stamps of several countries, put in a bid for the U.S. stamp printing contract.

Bids were due on November 15, 1893 and there were three bidders: Hamilton (\$179,294.40), the reigning printer, the American Bank Note Co. of New York (\$162,401.61) and Charles F. Steel of Philadelphia (\$146,454.93). After the bids were announced, Steel and American began to attack one another. Formal protests were filed by both. Hamilton also retained their formal rights during hearings.

About two weeks after the bid date, the U.S. Bureau of Engraving and printing was allowed to submit a bid as well. They undercut Steel by \$28,000 and were awarded the contract, launching a 100 year era of Bureau Issues.

The End of the Era

Seebeck passed away of tuberculosis at the age of 42 in 1899. At the time, he had just regained control at Hamilton, but effectively, the era of Latin American Seebecks had come to an end.

Today, there is a great following of Seebeck students. They struggle to identify original printings from the reprints. They also seem to relish postal history of the period for the countries involved. Covers certainly provide usages of the original printings.
